


Early Childhood Workforce Connector




The Education System in the US

Youth Apprenticeship & Youth RA

Youth Apprenticeship

- Flexible structure and duration
- May or may not lead to certification or recognized credential

Youth Registered Apprenticeship

- Provide practical skills
- Work experience
- Involve partnerships between schools and businesses

- Structured programs registered with the US Department of Labor
- Leads to an industry recognized credential



Discover how to get a CDA in High School!

- Guided by the belief that all students should be college or career ready, in 2011 the Council began allowing high school students enrolled in Career & Technical Education Programs (CTE) to earn the CDA® Credential.
- In April 2021, the Council launched the highly successful ***Child Development Associate® (CDA) Handbook for High School: A Guide to Advocacy and Implementation***
- May 2022 launch of the ***High School CDA® Career & Technical Education Coaching, Training and Technical Assistance Program***



High School CDA® Student Requirements

- A junior or senior enrolled in a high school career and technical education program (training/classes can start as a freshman or sophomore).
- Complete **120 clock hours of formal early childhood education training**, covering the growth and development of children (setting specific), with no fewer than 10 hours in each of the Council's eight CDA Subject Areas.
- Complete **480 hours of work experience within the last three years working with children** (setting specific). Experience may be as paid staff or volunteer.
- Complete a **CDA® Professional Portfolio** (includes family questionnaires). Each student's portfolio must contain a copy of an official letter on school letterhead or a certificate verifying 120 clock hours of training.



Mapping Youth Apprenticeship to the High School CDA

- High School CTE CDA programs can be the **“best first step”** for candidates starting either a pre-apprenticeship or youth apprenticeship work experience.
- Registering your CTE program as an apprenticeship can **create infrastructure to get students paid** while they complete their required 480 hours of CDA work experience.
- Mentorship can look and function differently for youth than adults – and the High School CDA **fosters close relationships** with faculty advisors who can offer guidance to students on their apprenticeship pathway.

Benefits to Students

- Can include education offered **concurrently or in the same cycle** as workforce preparation & training
- Students graduate high school **career-ready** with the **nationally recognized** CDA® Credential
- Jump-start higher education with **core knowledge** of child development
- Potential to earn **college credit** while still in high school
- **Gain valuable skills and competencies** that early childhood employers want
- Have the **knowledge, skills, and confidence** to work with young children.

Looking Ahead

- Registering CDA CTE programs can promote equity. Students who previously would not have been able to spend time on unpaid hours will now have more opportunities as paid apprenticeships multiply nationally.
- More states are now looking to identify and maximize all available ECE funding for equitable and sustained expansion of registered youth apprenticeships.
- Continue conversations with the CDA as the “Best First Step” as the youth apprenticeship landscape further expands across the country.
